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Non-Violent Parole Review Process

Inmate Ramirez is a violent, anti-social offender. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of violence to the community.

In the instant case, Inmate Ramirez was identified by a Sacramento County drug task force as a large scale methamphetamine dealer. The investigation of Ramirez culminated in a search warrant being served at his house. That search revealed salable quantities of methamphetamine and marijuana, and four guns. When interviewed, Ramirez admitted that the drugs and guns were his.

This conduct is particularly disturbing given the Inmate's long criminal history and life-long commitment to dealing drugs in our community. Ramirez has been convicted of felony drug trafficking and sentenced to state prison on four separate occasions. In 1992, 2 years state prison on HS 11378. In 1998, another 2 years state prison on HS 11378. In 2003, 4 years state prison on HS 11379, and in 2007, 4 years, 8 months state prison for HS 11379. Despite spending much of his adult life in prison for trafficking narcotics, Ramirez returned to this lifestyle immediately in 2013 and was found armed as well. It is obvious that he either has no insight into his criminal behavior or just does not care to live a law abiding life. In either scenario, Ramirez remains a violent danger to our community because drug trafficking inherently brings violence and danger to the community with it. Not only is it a destructive drug for the user, but it is also a dangerous target for other nefarious actors trying to make a quick score or protect valuable drug turf. It is hard to imagine that Ramirez has been rehabilitated in 4 short years after living this way his entire life.

As we are given 30 days to respond, and we are not provided with any disciplinary history or any other information aside from the one page notice of parole review, I cannot comment on inmate Ramirez's prison conduct. However, from the record that is available it is clear that inmate Ramirez should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Parole should be denied.
