RE: Gonzalez, Vincent #V-10530

Inmate Gonzalez is a poster child for who should NOT be released as a 'Non-Violent Second Striker.'

[REDACTED] In August 2000, and by the time Inmate Gonzalez was 17 years of age, he was being charged with attempted murder and shooting at an occupied dwelling. In the years that followed that conviction (see Sacramento Superior Court #00F06947), inmate Gonzalez continued on his criminal path, and as evidenced by the three CDC numbers reflected on his rap sheet, failed to take advantage of each parole date he was given and live as a productive member of society.

In 2003, inmate Gonzalez was sentenced to state prison for transporting controlled substances (see Sacramento Superior Court #03F03137) and has, while in the custody of CDCR, earned consecutive prison sentences for violations such as PC 4502 (prisoner possessing a weapon) and PC 404 (participating in a riot) clearly demonstrating that he lacks the maturity and most importantly, the desire, to become a productive member of any society. In 2013, inmate Gonzalez was sentenced to 4 years state prison by the Sacramento County Superior Court (See Sacramento Superior Court #13F02715) for VC 2800.2(a) (Attempting to Evade Peace Officer While Driving Recklessly)—the most terrifying demonstration to date of this inmate's willful and wanton disregard for anyone but himself.

Clearly this inmate's repeated failures to transition smoothly into a community and live as a productive member of that community indicate a high propensity for recidivism. The Sacramento County District Attorney's Office strongly believes that he is not an appropriate candidate for early parole. Inmate Gonzalez has demonstrated time and time again as seen in his multiple parole violations that he still poses a viable and unreasonable risk to public safety. It is our hope that denying inmate Gonzalez's early parole will give him the opportunity to utilize CDCR's various programs and services to explore and put in to place a realistic parole plan in the future.
