
Thank you for the opportunity to address the Board in making their decision on Inmate Killian's suitability for release. Quite simply, Inmate Killian is a terrible candidate for early parole release. Since 1994, she has received 8 felony convictions and 5 misdemeanor convictions. Her crimes range from reckless driving with substantial bodily injury, where she ran over her boyfriend, breaking both his legs and his collar bone, to simple drug possession.

Inmate Killian's preferred crime is identify theft, where she has received four felony convictions on four separate cases. Although she is a career thief, the commitment offense was particularly despicable because she took advantage of a position of trust, stealing the personal identifying information of her family members. Inmate Killian even stole the identity of her 88 year old grandmother. This is clear evidence that there is no line that she won't cross for her own benefit.

It also cannot be argued that the conditions of Parole or active supervision will deter the defendant or protect the community. In her commitment offense, Inmate Killian was on active PRCS for identity theft when she stole her grandmother's identity. Clearly, Inmate Killian has learned over the years and is sophisticated enough to continue her fraudulent operations despite having a Parole officer and search conditions. Drug treatment will also be ineffective in protecting our community or ending Inmate Killian's life of crime. In her statement to Sacramento County Probation, Inmate Killian herself admits that she has already been to 4-5 different drug treatment programs. Obviously, when given the opportunity to change, Inmate Killian has instead chose to remain loyal to her criminal ways.

The People are mindful of the Board's arduous task of identifying our most egregious offenders and then targeting our great State's precious and scarce resources appropriately. Inmate Killian **DESERVES** a bed behind bars in one of our fine penal institutions. The Sacramento County District Attorney strongly believes that Inmate Killian is a poor candidate for early parole.
