Over the course of two decades, Inmate Cano has done it all: burglary, vehicle theft, driving under the influence causing injury, drugs, receiving stolen property, grand theft, and evading and resisting police. His disregard for others and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of violence to the community and he should not be paroled.

Inmate Cano has shown time and time again that he is unwilling to abide by supervision when he is not in prison. In 2006, witnesses saw Inmate Cano pry open the Victim's front door with a screwdriver, enter the victim's home, and steal her property. While on probation for that strike offense, Inmate Cano fought with and evaded police, which sent him back to prison. Being on probation for a strike offense was not enough to deter Inmate Cano from committing new crimes. In fact, since 1995, Inmate Cano has never successfully completed a term of probation. As is evidenced by his pattern of criminal behavior, Inmate Cano is not someone who is amendable to supervision.

As we are given 30 days to respond, and we are not provided with any disciplinary history or any other information aside from the one page notice of parole review, I cannot comment on inmate Cano's prison conduct. However, from the record that is available it is clear that inmate Cano should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Parole should be denied.
