RE: DeMartini-Pavel, Shane CDC# WF1592

On February 13, 2012, a bartender called 9-1-1 to report that "I had a customer get a bottle broken across his face and he has a 2 inch gash above his eye and you can see straight through his skull." That customer required 9 sutures to close his facial wound and Inmate DeMartini was the wielder of the beer mug that caused his injury. What was the victim's 'offense'? He was laughing too loudly with his friends. Inmate DeMartini was convicted of assault with a deadly weapon and infliction of great bodily injury.

That was not the first time she had been accused of wielding a bottle and causing injuries to someone's face. In 2010 she was arrested for domestic violence under remarkably similar circumstances.

On June 28, 2012, while pending court on her felonious 2012 assault, she was arrested yet again for domestic violence. She was angry with her boyfriend and told him she was breaking up with him and wanted him to move out. When he didn't immediately comply with her demand, she began beating him with her fists about 10 times. She was arrested and convicted of misdemeanor domestic violence for this assault.

While pending the above two cases, she was arrested yet again while out on bail for petty theft.

Inmate DeMartini-Pavel has proven that it matters not whether it be a loved one or a complete stranger—no one is safe when she allows her temper to get the best of her.

Inmate DeMartini's most recent conviction further illuminates her penchant for the predation of others. After stealing a purse from a car, Inmate DeMartini went on a spending spree, hopping from store to store writing checks and swiping credit cards. Additionally, Inmate DeMartini was simultaneously running a fraudulent check scheme, swindling businesses out of their hard earned money by passing phony checks.

If Inmate DeMartini sees an opportunity to hurt someone, physically or otherwise, to benefit herself she will not hesitate. She cares not if the weapon is a glass to teach someone a lesson for being too loud or a pen and a blank check to wreak havoc on someone's finances. Since she is a danger to both person and property, the District Attorney of Sacramento is opposed to her early release.
