Inmate Sans has proven to the State of California – on at least seventeen separate occasions – that he is a dangerous, unrepentant thief, who will continue to prey on the community. In short, the circumstances surrounding Inmate Sans' current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of violence to the community.

If one were to look up the phrase "career criminal" in a dictionary, you would likely find a booking photograph of Nyle Michael Sans. Over the past nineteen (19) years, Inmate Sans has been found to have committed eight (8) felonies, four (4) misdemeanors, and three (3) violations of probation and three (3) parole violations resulting in at nine (9) separate commitments to the Department of Corrections. Inmate Sans has done nothing but commit crime after crime after crime. The only time that ordered society is free from Inmate Sans life of crime is when he is incarcerated and unable to plague our criminal justice system – granting Inmate Sans early parole does nothing but move forward the date that he eventually re-offends, is yet again convicted, and yet again re-committed to state prison.

On June 29, 2017, Inmate Sans was sentenced to four (4) years state prison suspended pending successful completion of two (2) years in the Delancey Street Program for the crime of Vehicle Code section 10851. Instead of reporting to the Probation Department and the Delancey Street Program, Inmate Sans failed to appear, and a bench warrant was issued. Thereafter, on November 27, 2017, Inmate Sans was observed by officers driving another stolen car. Inmate Sans yielded to the officer's lights and sirens, but then refused to follow any other directives for the next thirty-five (35) minutes. Finally, officers had to shoot pepper spray into the car in order to get Inmate Sans to

comply. Inmate Sans was also found to be driving on a suspended license and he had the outstanding warrant for this arrest. Inmate Sans was sentenced to an aggregate total of nine (9) years in state prison.

While it might be easy to write off Inmate Sans' commitment offense as "just another property crime," the non-stop, pervasive nature of Inmate Sans' criminal history demonstrates a continued inability to follow the rules of ordered society. In other words, Inmate Sans' continuous, nearly non-stop pattern of crime is a virtual guarantee that once he is released from prison custody, he will victimize another innocent person and continue to engage in criminal behavior.

Having demonstrated an inability to maintain a crime-free lifestyle for any appreciable period of time, it is only when Inmate Sans is forcibly removed from free society and incarcerated that the public is free of his criminal activity. If the Board is interested in increasing the amount of crime in California, then releasing Inmate Sans is one of the quickest ways to guarantee that result: his repeated violations of the law provides certain proof that Inmate Sans will re-offend and endanger the citizens of California once he is released from prison custody.

As the District Attorney's Office is only given thirty (30) days to respond and are not provided with any disciplinary history or other information aside from the one-page notice of parole review, I am unable to comment on Inmate Sans' prison conduct. As Inmate Sans has been incarcerated for only three (3) years and ten (10) months, it is unreasonable to conclude that he has transformed his behavior in such a short period of time after not doing so for the past nineteen (19) years. From the record that is available, Inmate Sans should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Parole should be denied.
